150 Years Of History

Built in 1871, this house certainly has been an iconic jewel in our community and has served so many purposes and has supported so many great causes over the years. The home's original owner was Mayor John Franklin Cook. He and his wife, Addie, raised 3 children in the home. John was an early land developer, hardware store owner and as Mayor was described as one of Mower County's pioneer residents. His wife Addie was regarded as Austin's first music teacher. I'm certain there were many great memories for the Cook family in this beautiful home.

Archival photographs indicate that the 1871 house was two stories in height and built of red brick with a bracketed hip and gable roof.

And so the Hormel story begins.....

In 1887, on a business trip to Austin, Minnesota, George met Albrecht Friedrich and opened the Friedrich and Hormel meat market that October. Hormel and Friedrich parted ways in 1891. George used the money he received from the dissolved partnership with Friedrich to establish his own packinghouse on the outskirts of Austin: Geo. A. Hormel and Company. For years George struggled with the competition before he realized that his road to success would be to devise a business strategy that emphasized quality over quantity and innovation over imitation.

George's strategy paid off and in 1901, George Albert Hormel purchased the Cook House for a whopping \$3,000 and commissioned architect Harry Wild Jones to embark on a major remodeling effort. The result, completed in 1902, was a transformation of the exterior into a neoclassical design.

As the company grew George needed the help of his father and three younger brothers for the implementation of his business plan and the further expansion his business. By 1912 George employed 300 workers. His brothers assumed managerial positions within the company and George turned to the Austin community for additional workers. His general policy was to cultivate local talent and promote employees from within company ranks.

George Hormel's autocratic approach, together with his concern for treating his workers fairly and with dignity, made for a paternalistic leadership style. Although an exacting boss, Hormel maintained a good relationship with his employees because he was viewed as "one of them".

George's career was not without conflict. In 1921 assistant comptroller Cy Thomson was discovered to have embezzled over \$1 million from the company. A second consequence of the company's rapid growth was the breakdown in peaceful labor relations. The peacefulness that George had relished in during the company's early years.

Despite these challenges, the Geo. A. Hormel and Company continued to thrive and become a household name around the world. George was never able to remove himself completely from the company he had grown. George's ongoing concern for his company was matched by his concern for the welfare of both his workers and workers throughout the nation. The paternalistic concern he exhibited for his employees extended to all Americans suffering from the effects of the Great Depression. George advocated for the adoption of unemployment relief and a federal pension for retired workers.

In 1927 Mrs. George A. Hormel presented the keys to her home and all the treasures inside to the YWCA. And in 1929 George, now retiring, handed over control of his company to his son, Jay. Over the next several years Jay took the company to new heights, especially after the introduction of our beloved SPAM in 1937.

In the early 1990s the home was transformed from the YWCA into a Historic Home Museum dedicated to the history and preservation of the Hormel family. Here we are 150 years later as the Hormel Historic Home, still carrying out the family legacy of Hospitality, Music, Education, and community service just as George and Lillian had intended.




